Blessings, Pastor Amanda+ Last July we began working with the wonderful children who live in Springfield Apartments, aka Joe Louis. We've built relationships with them and their families and are glad to be on this journey with them. This summer was the culmination of our first year together, with children laughing, playing and learning with the help of you, our Christian community.

In June 10 of our youngest ones went to St. John's Workshop of Wonders Vacation Bible School (VBS). What a great way for them to start the summer, wrapped in God's love! They sang, did crafts, learned about God, and saw God at work in their hearts, leaders, and activities. They were excited to have been chosen to attend, and loved the special attention they had for a whole week! We provided breakfast and sack lunches for them, and they truly felt wrapped in God's love from start to finish of the day.

The following week 16 older children left for Camp St. Michael at Camp Weed. But before the bus leaves, much takes place to make this extraordinary experience happen. There are the donations of clothes, pillows, towels, and money from you. There's the planning by the Camp Weed staff. There are prayers offered by you for their health/safety, and volunteers help us get things ready. Before leaving, the children painted nightshirts (men's T's), labeled clothes with names, made luggage tags, and packed their things in a pillowcase. On Sunday, June 29, they came to church with their families to be blessed for this adventure, and we left at 6am the next day. After a picnic breakfast at the rest stop near Live Oak, they arrived at camp to begin this new adventure of kayaking, rock wall climbing, and living in a cabin in the woods.

A week after returning from camp, the VBS and camp children were in our two-week Reading Academy designed to refresh their reading skills prior to returning to school. We picked them up, had lunch at Grace Mission, then bussed them to St John's where we were blessed to use their Sunday School rooms for the Academy. These 24 children were divided into reading groups and rotated through four activity centers: readers' circle, readers' theater, activity/arts & crafts, and move and groove. In readers' circles they read and discussed the stories and continued discussions in the arts & crafts center where activities were based on the theme of the books.
